WHY MEEKLAND AVE IS CONSIDERING NEW DEVELOPMENT

20449 Meekland Ave is a house that has been abandoned for over 15 years in the city of Hayward. This house has brought many trespassers who have created altercations over the unsolicited space. Most recently a group of homeless people have continuously occupied the house during the past couple of years. This group disregards the countless arrests made and continue to return. This constant disruption has much impact on residents yet the cycle we see remains untouched.



TINY HOMES

We want to demolish the abandoned house and create a community center for those in need of resources and a space to feel included. In the space behind, we will have a village of tiny homes for homeless people. That area will include communal restrooms, a picnic area, and more.



PARTICIPATORY DESIGN

Having a diverse group of community members from local homeless people, to neighbors, architects and designers, and you on our board to discuss plans, events, and schedules for the sites. We will have drop-ins at Cherryland Elementary school.



COMMUNITY GARDEN

We are welcoming the entire community to enjoy some freshly grown produce by our stewards and neighbors in the 204-69 address. This garden will include a picnic area and benches to allow satisfaction and convenience for community engagement.



TINY HOMES

AN ECOVILLAGE FOR A COMMUNITY

The abandoned house is originally 982 sqft and we will expand the community center to be 1,500 sqft. This is how we will include a kitchen, lounge, multipurpose room, and more for our incoming residents.

The green empty space behind is approximately 15,700 sqft. This allows us to build 30 100-120 sqft homes; size does indeed accommodate those with disabilities. Each house will cost \$6,500 and will be built by our fellow East Bay Habitat for Humanity Volunteers.

Storage facilities, a laundry room, 15 picnic tables, and communal restrooms will also be incorporated into the project.

An open field will serve as a space for activities and events for our residents and neighbors as well.

This project has a focus on addressing Sustainable Development Goal # 11, Sustainable Cities and Communities.

The village of tiny homes and the community garden will not only unite a city's residents but will also combat one of the most prevalent issues in the city, homelessness. We will teach our community how to live with one another's cooperation, knowledge, and achievements through the two progressing sites.

VACANT LOT

After some investigation, the resistance for constructing on this site comes from the underground gasoline pipes that must be cleared out. Yet no person or organization has been willing to pay the cost of it

Our proposal for creating a a community garden will provide a temporary (potentially permanent) option. That is a garden that can be utilized by the Hayward community.

H.A.R.D has agreed to do monthly maintenance checks on both sites to ensure that the outdoor space is being well taken care of.

We ask the city of Hayward to take on this policy transfer as San Jose's lead for establishing a tiny home community has immensely inspired this project. Unlike the past, we would like to be plenty more accessible for potential inhabitants of they can register in our tiny home village and start a new life.

This is a local and community-based operation. In order to maintain this project for future years, it is significant to have in mind that it is not only a goal but a continuing process. We will depend on the governance of our neighbors in the village and community members to help sustain the garden and housing as well as H.A.R.D and Habitat for Humanity Volunteen have pledged to return for any necessary maintenance in the sites.

Hayward was infamous for its Cherry orchards. To pay homage to the rich history of Hayward and the nearby unincorporated area, Cherryland, we will plant Cherry trees in the community garden and village. Through storytelling, we will share the history of Hayward's past relevance of being a major fruit-crowing area.






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Community Museum in Oakland Arch 100A Prof. Atwood

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





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Duplex Living Arch 11B: Introduction to DesignProf. Rudabeh Pakravan (Arch)











